# Why We Built This

1

The world was missing all of the following:

- An **open access** platform tracking global supply chain risks, including forced labor
- A platform built by experts on supply chains
- A mission-driven, non-neutral trade platform

# What is Supply Trace?

## An open platform



Supply Trace is an open-access tool that identifies potential risks in global supply chains to enable effective due diligence and accountability.

## Pilot phase



In its pilot phase, it focuses on the apparel sector and links between forced labor in the Uyghur Region of China and shipments to the US.

## Base layer of trade data



Supply Trace is populated with customs records, such as shipping and bill of lading data, and other publicly available supply chain information.

## Deep subject matter expertise



Additional intelligence, derived from desk-based research, is layered over the core supply chain data.

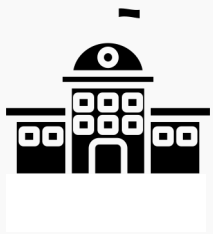
## Built for scale



In the future, Supply Trace will progressively expand to other industries, affected regions and categories of risk.



# Our USP: Subject Matter Expertise, Open Access Data



## Grounded in rigorous, academic research

- A base layer of **trade data** is overlaid with desk-based **research intelligence**
- Curated by expert researchers with experience on these unique issues
- In the pilot phase, led by a team of Uyghur nationals, with deep subject matter expertise relating to issues of forced labor in the Uyghur Region of China
- Supply Trace is progressively expanding to additional:
  - industries
  - affected regions
  - categories of risk

## Sector Expansion



Currently focused on the apparel sector, Supply Trace will expand to track forced labor affecting other sectors.

## Geographic Expansion



Supply Trace will grow to trace forced labor connected to regions beyond China.

## Risk Expansion

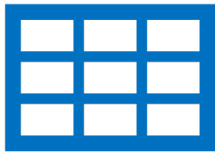


Over time, additional risk metrics will be incorporated, focused on climate risk and its impact on people working in supply chains.



# Premium Feature Development

## Bulk screening



The ability to privately screen an entire supplier list in bulk and receive a report on risk exposure.

## Risk Alerts

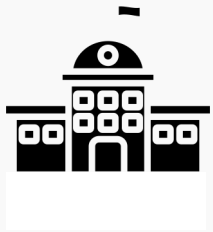


Receive an alert when the risk status of entities in Supply Trace changes, or new at-risk entities come into the database.

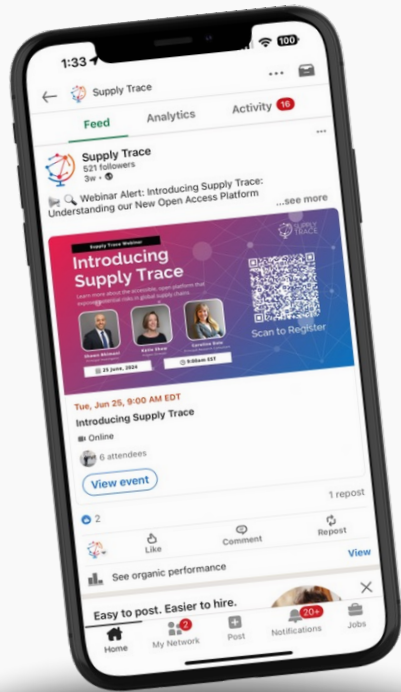
